

REMEMBERING FORMER IPI DIRECTOR ROGER BAYSDEN, 1948 – 2014

Roger L. Baysden, IPI Director from 1996 to 2011, passed away on Tuesday, July 15, 2014. Roger touched the lives of hundreds of offenders in Iowa during his tenure as IPI Director. While his full obituary can be found online at <http://www.legacy.com/obituaries/desmoinesregister/obituary.aspx?pid=171749618>, the excerpt below relates to his tenure as IPI Director.

In 1996, he joined State Government as Director of Iowa Prison Industries, where he quickly turned Iowa Prison Industries (IPI) into one of the premier industries in the United States. While shaping the future of IPI, he was elected and served as first, Vice-President, President and, finally, Chairman of the Board for the National Correctional Industries Association, located in Baltimore, MD, where he set out reshaping the future of prison industries across the country. Today, IPI is recognized for the many founding work programs that offer hope and opportunity for those offenders who desire to become productive citizens. During his tenure as Chairman, Iowa enjoyed the lowest recidivism rate for offenders in the United States. His passion for helping offenders get on the right track in life led him and his staff to raise one million dollars to buy land and construct a permanent showroom that displays samples of the many items that offenders manufacture. The property was donated to the citizens of Iowa. In 2011, Governor Branstad dedicated by proclamation and named the building the "Baysden Building" in honor of his contributions to reducing recidivism and costs to the taxpayers of Iowa.

As our thanks for all he did for IPI and Iowa's offenders, IPI has donated a memorial bench to Roger's local church, Lutheran Church of Hope in West Des Moines (see photo page 2).



DENIM JEANS TRAVEL FORT TO FORT

We recently took the first steps toward expanding IPI's textile operations, which will entail a new production facility at the Fort Dodge Correctional Facility (FDCF). The expansion means new opportunities for our staff and offenders.

IPI will initially employ one staff member and 20-25 offenders, producing denim jeans for the state institutions. Production of denim jeans has moved from Fort Madison to Fort Dodge in the past few years, with a stop at Mitchellville in between. Staff and offenders at ICIW worked with ISU to improve the design of the jeans and modernize their production, but were unable to keep up with the needs of the eight male prisons across the state.

The new operation in Fort Dodge will be managed by Justin Opfer

and the Mitchellville team, and from the beginning will adapt the philosophy and tools of lean manufacturing. The production space is currently being prepared, and Justin is recruiting a new staff member. We expect to begin production in early 2015.

IPI doesn't plan to reduce the work training positions for offenders at Mitchellville, as there are many opportunities for us to expand in the textiles arena, including scrubs and uniforms.

Fort Dodge houses 1,300 offenders and we have needed for quite some time to put a work training program there. Growth in textiles will provide more opportunities down the road for these men, as will a private sector call center being planned. Warden Jim McKinney and the FDCF management team have been very welcoming and are working hard to help IPI start up the new production operation!

IPI-FM RECEIVES LEAN AWARD

IPI-Fort Madison has been awarded the 2014 Iowa Partners in Efficiency Award, presented by the Iowa Lean Consortium.

The award recognizes a team within a political subdivision that, through the use of Lean tools and techniques, significantly increases productivity and promotes innovation, resulting in the improvement of public services to the benefit of the citizens of Iowa and the private sector.

In 2012, IPI partnered with Southeastern Community College to help staff and offenders learn the philosophy and tools of lean manufacturing. In less than one year, the Fort Madison team was able to increase cabinet production from 2 kitchen sets per week to 2 kitchen sets per day, a 5-fold increase!

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Under the leadership of Becky Jones, Associate Warden for Industries, offenders and staff worked in teams gathering data, problem solving, presenting findings, and implementing changes. Project updates were given to IPI leadership, and for many offenders it was the first time in their lives using PowerPoint and having their ideas taken seriously by someone in a position of authority. It was dramatic evidence that Lean can be implemented virtually anywhere.

The Iowa Lean Consortium (www.iowalean.org) is a non-profit organization with more than 100 members dedicated to advancing Lean in all sectors of the economy. ILC is a leading resource to Iowa companies who seek to improve their organizational effectiveness and efficiencies.

NEW FINISHING SYSTEM UP & RUNNING




Offenders apply spray finish using the new spray equipment.

Both Fort Madison and Mount Pleasant have new, more efficient finishing equipment. The new Graco equipment utilizes air-assisted airless technology for the application of finish versus using spray pots.

Industries Technician Shane Blanchard helped move us forward through his prior experience and research. We also switched products to a Sherwin Williams catalyzed lacquer. With the new equipment and different product, we have improved the transfer efficiencies, putting more product on the item being finished with less waste emissions.

Sherwin Williams' technical support has provided training at no cost and has worked with both staff and offenders in application techniques. They also assisted in performance testing required to meet KCMA (Kitchen Cabinet Manufacturers Association) standards. IPI passed all KCMA testing along with the 15 additional cold checks that Sherwin Williams tests beyond those required for KCMA. All of these updates have helped Fort Madison provide a nicer finish with fewer emissions to the environment. ♣

This issue's newsletter focus is on the Sign Shop. Since we last visited them in April 2011, the shop has continued to grow the services it provides.

Probably one of the most notable trends in the sign business is the increase in digital printing to address the needs of customers who desire higher end graphics. The sign shop has responded to increased preference for eye-catching signage that will last a long time. We have upgraded our plotter/cutter, sheeting slitter machine, digital printer and software to ensure that our offerings are the same high quality that customers have known us for.

We also have new faces in the shop. Mark Hollenback is the Production Coordinator for Sign shop. Mark has many years of experience as a coordinator in our Metal Furniture division, and he is quickly

settling in with his new role. Senior Technician Pat Fowler is working in the Silk Screening area of the shop and is a Certified Screen Printer. Completing the team are IPI Technician Wayne Leytem in the blanking area of the sign shop and IPI Supervisor Greg Hart providing experienced leadership. The experienced customer service team in the front office works closely with the plant staff to create some unique sign products.

While regulatory signs are the products most people would recognize, the work of signage is very diverse. Specialty signage includes park trail markings, kiosk informative displays, vehicle graphics for law enforcement, utility markings, banners for gyms or main street events, luminescent safe-room markings, water trail signs, and community way finding systems to promote tourism. The uses for IPI signage are virtually limitless. ◀

FIRST OFFENDER COMPLETES IPI-DOC APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM

Iowa Prison Industries is pleased to announce the first offender has completed one of the apprenticeship programs available at the Anamosa State Penitentiary.

Iowa Prison Industries, the Department of Corrections, and Kirkwood Community College have teamed up to offer ten apprenticeship programs to Anamosa offenders. All the programs are recognized and approved by the Federal Department of Labor's Office of Apprenticeship. As of June 30, 2014, fifty-one offenders are enrolled in the following programs: welding, computer operator, cabinet maker, cook, electrician (maintenance), refrigeration/air conditioner mechanic, maintenance repairer, plumber, fabricator-assembler metal production, and electrostatic powder coating technician.

Offenders enroll in the program through IPI, but the coursework and testing must be completed during the offenders' spare time. Testing is administered by Kirkwood Community College staff at ASP. Each apprenticeship also requires significant work hours in the field of study that are completed either in the institution or in one of IPI's shops. IPI administers the program by logging test scores and work hours as well as sending this information to the Department of Labor.

The first offender completing an apprenticeship program is Offender Anderson, a long-time employee in IPI's License Plate Shop; his apprenticeship certificate was earned for Computer Operator. ◀


OFFENDERS RATE CANTEEN

Survey Results




Scale: 1 = Excellent, 2 = Good, 3 = Below Average

ANOTHER BUSY SUMMER FOR M&I AT ISU

IPI Move & Install had another full summer at Iowa State University Department of Residence in 2014. The summer started off with Robert Mesecher, Dan Crook and their workers debunking 822 beds in Maple and Martin Halls while, at the same time, removing over 450 complete units out of Wallace Hall before the elevators were removed for replacement and the rest of the building began being remodeled. When the crews returned to Wallace Hall in July, they were allowed to install the new furniture manufactured and delivered by Fort Madison, starting on the eighth floor and working down. What made this particular install at Wallace a little different was 1) the installs had to occur after hours to stay out of the way of the remodeling crews, and 2) the interior elevators were down, so IPI had to use the external elevator.

The second phase of the ISU summer project was an installation of an additional 570 units of new furniture at Maricopa - again a twist. Not only did IPI have a two week deadline, but as the map illustrates, this installation wasn't just one building, it was several buildings on a property of about 60 acres. With furniture coming in from two different IPI plants and an outside vendor with semi loads of mattresses and leather furnishings, it was by far an orchestrated effort to coordinate forklifts, flat carts, semitrailers and workers moving from one

building to the other, while still being supervised, still installing, still picking up and pitching trash, trying to minimize the damage to ISU property, and completing all of this on a very tight schedule.

A special thanks goes out to everyone who helped make this summer happen with all the schedule changes, especially Warden Mapes, Sergeant Fresh and the CRC Crew; Warden Smith and Pam Wise, and the NCCF CO's and Crew; Craig Ahlen and Laura Mendez from FM, and Wayne Schilling and Tim Diesburg and the folks from Anamosa. Finally, I would like to say thanks to ISU and their continued support of IPI and its products and services, and most importantly to this program. A special thanks goes to Dan Crook and Robert Mesecher from Des Moines. It was most definitely an exciting summer.
